## **GREETINGS FROM THE BOARD!**

The 2018-2019 fiscal year brought many exciting changes to MCRS and the MCRS Board of Directors.

In November 2018, Nan Cressman (past Chair), Shelley and I were able to attend the three-day Manulife Board Governance Boot Camp presented by Capacity Canada, thanks to the generous sponsorship of Kindred Credit Union. The time spent was intense and highly effective and provided us with new tools and perspectives to bring to our work.

After the January 2019 AGM, the new Board of Directors restructured our approach to Board Governance with a focus on Committee work. This enabled the Board to make significant progress on many governance items over the last year including Strategic Planning, Human Resources and updated Governance policies and procedures. With the shift of detail work to Committees, the Board meetings became more focused on discussion and decisions rather than information gathering and dissemination. I am very proud of what our teams have accomplished! Transitional and emergency housing for our guests newly arriving is always a concern as affordable housing in the KW community is scarce and shelter options are limited. When Ray of Hope notified us they were closing their Welcome Home program for refugee claimants, this matter became urgent. Our Executive Director presented this opportunity to incorporate the housing program into MCRS programs. The Board already recognized that to effectively support our guests, we needed to expand our services to include a focus on housing, employment supports and food security.



However, we hadn't thought it would happen so soon and in such a large way! After many hours of discussion and debate, multiple rounds of information from MCRS staff and Ray of Hope and specific requirements and milestones being met, the Board of Directors joyfully approved the adoption of Welcome Home into the MCRS portfolio! The process also drove MCRS to develop a holistic housing transition model that has gained the support of government officials at several levels.

Thank you to everyone who has worked with MCRS over this past year. With the efforts and support of donors, volunteers, advocates and staff, people coming to our community seeking a new life and home experience a warm welcome and greater opportunity for justice. A special thank you to the members of the Board and Executive Team: Scott Lewis. Manuela Jimenez, Fabienne Prior, Jim Pankratz, Peggy Snyder, Rafael Vallejo, Thom Dixon and Shelley Campagnola (ED). Your support and hard work have made this year as Chair enjoyable and productive. Looking forward to next vear!

## EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Our mission to welcome and support refugee claimants in our community sounds simple but behind the words is a complex world of ever-changing rules, laws, forms, public and political perceptions, and immediate needs. Having a highly talented and deeply caring team that can "stay the course" with agility and responsiveness provides confidence and comfort to hundreds of people who need help navigating various legal and social systems.

Our culture is continuously being redefined with every person that joins our team, but, at our core, we are people who: have deep empathy and compassion; thrive on empowering others; promote a sense of community and belonging; and work hard to build what we do for the long term. We have an amazing blend of professionalism and personal connect likened to being a family.



One of our highlights of the past year was studying together Margaret Wheatley's book, *Walk Out, Walk On*, an inspiring call to rethink what it means to empower others. We were challenged to a more vital collaboration with others, and deeper engagement of those we help, believing in their resilience and capability to direct their own journey.

We also invested more intentionally with our Refugee Claimant Organization Coalition partners (22 like-minded organizations in Ontario), hosting one of the bimonthly meetings, and working together to ensure access to justice through advocacy for Legal Aid.

We also called on the respectful relationships we have been nurturing with our political and media leaders to successfully advocate for the continuance of the Transition Child Benefit.

Finally, we dug deep into a Brand review with the help of Graf-Martin Communications, listening to various stakeholders and exploring how we best live into our mission, vision and values. We are being increasingly recognized as a difference-maker that our community needs. From this we have stepped out courageously and are crafting a Strategic Plan for 2020 and beyond that focuses on **influence, action, and impact**.




## CLAIMS PROGRAM

This past year has been a busy and exciting one for the Casework Team at MCRS. There have been changes and plenty of challenges but the flow of incredible people who come through our door looking for help has remained consistent. We've continued to see high numbers with 255 new files opened over the fiscal year representing 626 individuals from around the world. At the end of our fiscal year in 2019 our Casework Team was working with a total of 764 cases representing over 1,847 men, women and children.

Caseworkers at MCRS play a variety of roles in the lives of the people we work with. Our role is always shaped primarily by our clients and their specific needs. Sometimes that means discussing the confusing and lengthy process that lies ahead of them or working together to explore options. In other cases we are very involved in the preparation of forms, making sure things are as accurate and complete as possible when mistakes can really matter. To some, we are the first people with whom they share their story as we work together to put painful experiences into words. We are often used as a local guide who can connect them with resources, activities and services and advocate for them where necessary.

We rely heavily on our partners in the social assistance, education, employment, legal and non-profit sectors to work with us to make this possible. Through all this we are relied on as a friend, someone they can turn to for help and who will accept, respect, and empower them.

Our clients usually work with their caseworkers for years and in that time we are privileged to be able to build strong relationships as we walk together through the process.




## CHANGES AND TRENDS

The refugee claimant world is very dynamic and tumultuous. Every year comes with its own changes and challenges and as an organization we have to be flexible and adaptive.

This past year at MCRS our numbers remained quite consistent as did the origin countries of our clients. The majority of the trends and challenges we have seen have been systematic. We struggled to help our clients know what to do when faced with sudden cuts to legal aid, which resulted in hundreds of claimants facing the prospect of hearings without legal representation, only to have the shortfall covered months later. Soon after we faced the threat of significant cuts to social assistance payments that would have seen many of our clients forced into the already overflowing shelter system; thankfully these cuts were cancelled at the last minute. These challenges highlighted how uncertain things can be for refugee claimants, vulnerable people who are often the first to suffer when governments try to cut costs.

On a more national scale we witnessed a surge of negative language regarding the population we work with. There was a rise in rhetoric that slandered and spread false information about claimants. In the run up to the election the government made some policy changes that have resulted in an even more complicated situation at the border.



At MCRS we have walked with claimants through this ever-changing system for over thirty years. In that time there has been a wide range of governmental and cultural attitudes, constantly changing global stability and significant changes in the numbers of people seeking safety in our region. Change is nothing new, the only constant is the need to remain flexible and adapt to what is happening around us. We will continue to do what we can to be a source of guidance and comfort for refugee claimants despite the changes and challenges into the future.

## **POSITIVE DECISIONS**

When a refugee claim is accepted, that paves the way to become a Permanent Resident and eventually a Canadian citizen. Clients often share that they were not living life to the fullest before the positive decision due to uncertainty. One of the clients called following their hearing in Toronto sharing that they had received a positive decision and said: "I have great news. It is the happiest day of my life. My life was stuck. Now, I can plan my future."

We are privileged to be part of the lives of 267 men, women and children who received a positive decision this year. For a high school graduate, it gives opportunity to pursue post-secondary studies as a domestic student. For a father whose children and wife are still back home, it gives hope to being together again. We witnessed several family reunifications this year. One of the highlights was a mother who was reunited with her children and husband after 3 years. She shared that though it took three years, she forgot the pain of separation when she met and hugged her family at the airport. Now, she can watch her children grow up and enjoy every moment of life. We are privileged to be part of these types of celebration. This gives us energy to continue the work we do and help clients in the journey until they are all home as a complete family.



Every need listed is also a referral a caseworker makes for clients to receive support from: lawyers, food bank, shelter/ community housing alternatives, and social assistance. Some other important services include: school enrollment, language assessment, counselling supports, outreach/settlement workers, and medical services. EVERY CLIENT WANTS THE BEST POSSIBLE OUT-COME. THEY SEE CANADA AS AN OPPORTUNITY TO START AGAIN, AND REBUILD THEIR LIVES.

Every client wants the best possible outcome. They see Canada as an opportunity to start again, and rebuild their lives. 


#### **ANNUAL REVENUE**



The increase over last year's budget reflects our adoption of the Welcome Home Program that provides much-needed temporary accommodation and food security for refugee claimants, and will provide access to ESL, employment readiness support, housing search support, and numerous other volunteer-run programs designed to promote relationships and accelerate people settling well into the community.

We are presently working with 1,582 men, women and children who are at various stages in the refugee claim journey. Over this next year, we will be seeking 600 people who will INVEST \$50 or more each month to ensure core, stable funding that will solidify our presence in the community and will change these people's lives forever!
